Helpful tips on how to build, coordinate, and maintain a successful secondary (6-12) music program.

This session explores helpful tips and strategies that we have utilized over the past five years to grow our string programs to over five hundred string students between our three schools. Anyone who teaches secondary band, orchestra, or choir can apply the principles being discussed, as many of our ideas have come from band and choir teachers, as well as successful orchestra directors. Topics addressed today will include:

- How to work together with your feeder middle schools to matriculate 8th grade students into your high school program (we have a 98% retention rate between our two middle schools for 8th grade orchestra students going into Loveland High School)
- Tips and strategies on how a high school director can support their middle school feeders, such as joint concerts, guest conductor opportunities, etc.
- How to set up a positive and respectful relationship between middle school and high school directors, including strategies on conflict resolution.
- What to do if your feeder program is struggling or if your feeder program is not taught by someone in that content area (i.e. a vocalist teaching strings, etc.)

In the time that we have worked together, we have created a large and successful string program. Neither of us began with more than fifteen students in a class, and our groups number between 40-60 per class now, and our advanced ensembles consistently receive superior marks at large group festival.

Much of this success is due to a coordinated effort on both our parts at the middle school level in terms of what skills we have agreed to teach our kids, what type of repertoire we perform, and orienting our middle school students with the high school orchestra environment prior to 9th grade registration. We have modeled our techniques off of other successful feeder systems in Colorado, Texas, Michigan, and elsewhere across the country.
