I. Selecting The Appropriate Repertoire

- What are my Resources?

 - It was the most beautiful Artistic performance EVER! **Poor Choice**
 - It had some challenges, but we made it! Students
 Really enjoyed playing it. Teaching Opportunities!

 Great Choice!

II. Preparing The Music

- STUDY AND LEARN YOUR SCORE!!!!!!
 - Never sight read with the students unless Sight Reading is the lesson!
 - Live the Music: Listen, Watch, Research and explore!!!
- Edit the Score and parts if necessary.
 - Edit Bowings
 - Add Fingerings
 - Highlight Musical Instructions (Dynamics nuances, etc.).
- Practice Copies

III. A Backwards design to rehearsing

- Comprehensive Musicianship is the end product, not the performance.
- Teach Concepts.
- Teach Transfer.

IV. Rehearsal Strategies

WARM UP

- 5-6 minutes before Tuning.
- Students select passages on their own

• STUDENT ASSESSMENT

- Choose a difficult passage that most sections find Challenging
- STUDENTS drive the assessment.

SMALL GROUP PERFORMANCES

- Group students by strong and weak ability so all groups are equal.
- Teach Students how to rehearse. (Small Group rehearsal Procedures).
- Regular Recitals with student feedback, and Summative Assessment.
- Assign repertoire to cover all areas of the piece.
- Half of class period for rehearsal (3-4 days to prepare performances)

• ROW BY ROW

- Isolate passages and have each row of students perform.
 - Mix up seating so all rows can perform

MIXED UP ORCHESTRA

- Heterogeneous seating.
- Helps students understand how their part relates to other parts.

INVERTED ORCHESTRA

- Turn the orchestra around
- Fosters better listening skills

FOUR CORNERS

- Divide the students into "small orchestras" in each corner
- Perform a large section of the piece across the corners.
- Shuffle the personnel to vary the group's experiences.

ARTISTIC LAYERING

- Choose a passage to rehearse.
- Prioritize the Musical Objectives.
- Stack and layer the passages.

VIDEO AND AUDIO RESOURCES

- Record your students with Video and Audio Recorders
- Play back instantly for STUDENT ASSESSMENT
- Have students listen to and watch audio and video recordings of your pieces.
